Tuition


is €4000 per annum. Individual courses are €400 per seminar.

About the AJS

THE ASSOCIATION FOR JEWISH STUDIES (AJS) was founded in 1969 by a small group of scholars seeking a forum for exploring methodological and pedagogical issues in the new field of Jewish Studies. Since its founding, the AJS has grown into the largest learned society and professional organization representing Jewish Studies scholars worldwide. As a constituent organization of the American Council of Learned Societies, the Association for Jewish Studies represents the field in the larger arena of the academic study of the humanities and social sciences in North America. The AJS's mission is to advance research and teaching in Jewish Studies at colleges, universities, and other institutions of higher learning, and to foster greater understanding of Jewish Studies scholarship among the wider public. Its 1800 members are university faculty, graduate students, independent scholars, and museum and related professionals who represent the breadth of Jewish Studies scholarship. The organization's institutional members represent leading programs and departments in the field and related organizations promoting Jewish Studies scholarship.

The AJS's major programs and projects include an annual scholarly conference, featuring more than 200 sessions; publications; professional development opportunities; job, fellowship, and grant opportunities; and public programs. The AJS publishes three primary publications: a peer-reviewed scholarly journal, AJS Review; a biannual magazine, AJS Perspectives, that explores methodological and pedagogical issues: and AJS Member News. a member-focused online publication. The AJS also operates the AJS Career Center, the most comprehensive listing of Jewish Studies job opportunities. The AJS administers the annual Jordan Schnitzer Book Awards, which recognize outstanding research in the field of Jewish Studies, as well as the AJS Dissertation Completion Fellowships and the Jordan Schnitzer First Book Publication Awards. The AJS engages the public through the podcast series Adventures in Jewish Studies, now in its fourth season.

Membership in the association is open to individuals whose full-time vocation is teaching, research, or related endeavors in academic Jewish Studies; to other individuals whose intellectual concerns are related to the purposes of the association; and to graduate students concentrating in an area of Jewish Studies. Institutional membership is open to Jewish Studies programs and departments, foundations, and other institutions whose work supports the mission of the AJS.

From the Executive Director

WELCOME!

It seems fitting that we are in Boston this year for the 54th annual AJS conference. Boston is always a bit of a homecoming for the AJS. It's where the organization was founded over 50 years ago, and Boston always draws our largest numbers of attendees; I guess AJS members have a thing for cold December nights. But this year, fingers crossed, is hopefully the year we will see a close-tonormal number of AJS members at the conference. Despite our best planning, nothing could have fully prepared us for the rapid rise of the Omicron variant at last year's Chicago conference, resulting in many last-minute cancellations. While no solution was ideal at that moment, the AJS made the decision in 2021 not to cancel and to go forward with a smaller conference for approximately 600 people. Those who were able to attend valued the ability to meet with other scholars in person, see old friends, and make new connections. We hope that this year sees only more of all those things.

You might be wondering as you hold this guidebook in your hands, where the actual program is and why we have decided not to include it. Over



the AJS conference has weathered a number of events: a strike at the conference hotel in 2018, a virtual conference in 2020, and mass cancellations due to COVID-19 in 2021. All of those major interruptions meant that the hours upon hours of work that the staff spent designing, proofing, and rechecking a print program book were essentially for naught, not to mention the steep economic and environmental costs of printing a full program book that was no longer useful. By the time the conference arrived, the expensive program book was already out of date. Even in a "normal" year, the conference experiences its fair share of last-minute changes and cancellations. Trying to keep up with all this in real time AND make that happen in print form has not been easy. For this reason, the entire program in its most up-to-date form lives on the AJS Conference app, which you can download for free and use over cell service or the free hotel wifi. This program is updated live and offers the most accurate and current view of what is happening, where, and when. We hope, though, that you will still peruse this guidebook for other information about the conference

as well as take a look at all the offers from the conference's many sponsors whose support of the AJS, financial and otherwise, makes this conference possible. If you have any questions about the conference app, please see an AJS staff member and they will be happy to assist you.

WELCOME TO THE 54TH ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE AJS

It is a privilege to greet you in my capacity as the organization's president. In the past year, I have heard from many of you, and I hope that over the course of the conference and the coming year, members continue to reach out to me, AJS Executive Director Warren Hoffman, and the AJS board to share their thoughts and interests. We are a member-based learned society, and it is vital for our success that we understand the diverse–and sometimes conflicting–needs of our members.

The past twelve months have been a period of tremendous growth for the AJS. As we entered last year's conference, we faced several obstacles. Some of those challenges, like the weaknesses in our governance structures, were specific to the Association; others, like the pandemic, were not. Over the last year, AJS leadership has worked hard to improve our governance structures and communications policies, to make ourselves available to members, and to consider and address the many obstacles that our members face in this changing world.

I am proud of the improvements the AJS board has made to its

Governance Structure and Practices.

Influenced by member feedback and recommendations made by the 2021 Leadership Task Force, the board implemented several changes. We now regularly meet every other month, which allows the board to be more planful and strategic. There is at least one board member sitting on all committees and task forces, and we have worked to clarify the responsibilities of leadership positions and ways to become involved in organizational leadership. We created a task force to consider how to best review and support our executive director and complemented our onboarding orientation with an exit interview process for leaders at the end of their service.

We have worked to address matters of Access. The board expressed its commitment to extant programs, such as our summer writing workshop, and to working with the newly created Diversity Equity and Inclusion committee. We launched our AJS Conversations series and began to tackle the growing financial need among our members. Because of the high number of applications for travel support for the 2022 conference, the board authorized an additional \$6,000 of spending from our reserves-in addition to the \$46,000 originally budgeted-for

individual travel grants. Current financial needs

also force us to think about how we practice development, and Warren and I have begun to work with the board to change development practices and expectations.

When you read our email communications or look to our website, I hope it is apparent how deeply the AJS board and staff value **Transparency**. We have publicized leadership opportunities, made our board minutes available on the AJS website, and regularly apprise members of AJS programs, opportunities, and developments.

Despite these advancements, we know there remains room for improvement. Our in-person conferences are not accessible to some of our members, and our 2024 online conference will pose obstacles to others. We need to better acknowledge and thank those who volunteer with the AJS. The board will be working on these and other **Strategic Initiatives** as it responds to the shifting needs and interests within our changing membership.

I am so glad that you are here, and hope that you enjoy the conference.


I look forward during these three precious days to learning from all of you.

Congratulations to the Salo Baron Prize Winner

The American Academy for Jewish Research is pleased to announce the winner of its annual Salo Baron Prize for the best first book in Jewish studies published in calendar year 2021. The prize honors:

Andrew Kornbluth, *The August Trials: The Holocaust and Postwar Justice in Poland* (Harvard University Press)

In *The August Trials*, Andrew Kornbluth examines a series of trials of Polish Nazi collaborators held in Poland during the decade or so following the end of World War II. Kornbluth demonstrates that far from being a tool in the hands of the Soviet authorities, these trials began as a genuine attempt to come to terms with the violence and murder committed by Poles under German occupation. With the passage of time, however, the trials became a site for creating a usable past for Poland, downplaying or even erasing Polish responsibility for the ethnic cleansing of Polish Jewry. *The August Trials* is a major contribution to the study of Polish-Jewish relations during and after the Holocaust, the search for justice in post-Holocaust Europe, and the nexus between history, memory, and politics in the 20th and 21st centuries.

Honorable Mention is awarded to Jason Lustig of the University of Texas, Austin for *A Time to Gather: Archives and the Control of Jewish Culture* (Oxford University Press). This is an innovative study of the establishment in the 20th century of Jewish archival institutions in Europe, Israel, and the United States. The author demonstrates how the creation of these archives involved a struggle not just to acquire the materials themselves but also to construct interpretations of both the Jewish past and present.

The American Academy for Jewish Research (www.aajr.org) is the oldest professional organization of Judaica scholars in North America. Its membership consists of senior scholars whose work has made a major impact on their field.

The Baron Prize honors the memory of the distinguished historian Salo W. Baron, a long-time president of the AAJR, who taught at Columbia University for many decades. It is one of the signal honors that can be bestowed on a young scholar in Jewish Studies and a sign of the excellence, vitality, and creativity of the field.

The American Academy for Jewish Research invites submissions for the Salo Wittmayer Baron Book Prize. The Baron Book Prize (\$3,000) is awarded annually to the author of an outstanding first book in Jewish studies.

Eligibility: An academic book, in English, in any area of Jewish studies published in calendar year 2022. The work must be the author's first scholarly book. Authors must have received their Ph.D. within the previous ten years, no earlier than 2012.

Deadline: Submissions must be received by January 31, 2023. The winner will be notified in late spring 2023.

When submitting a book for consideration, please have <u>four</u> copies sent, along with a statement including the author's email address and when and where the author received their Ph.D. In addition, please send a digital submission of the author's book to the below email address. Leo Baeck Institute Gerald Westheimer Career Development Fellowship

The Leo Baeck Institute is offering a Career Development Award as a personal grant to a scholar or professional in an early career stage, e.g. before gaining tenure in an academic institution or its equivalent, whose proposed work would deal with topics within the Leo Baeck Institute's mission, namely historical or cultural issues of the Jewish experience in German-speaking lands.

The award of up to \$25,000 will cover the period July 1, 2023 - June 30, 2024 and, at the discretion of the reviewing board, may be renewed for a second year.

The grant is intended to provide for the cost of obtaining scholarly material (e.g. publications), temporary help in research and production needs, membership in scholarly organizations, travel, computer, copying and communication charges and summer stipend for non-tenured academics.

Applications outlining the nature and scope of the proposed project including a budget should be submitted, in no more than two pages, by March 1, 2023 to Dr. Frank Mecklenburg, Leo Baeck Institute, 15 West 16th St. New York, NY 10011. The Art of Conferencing

AJS CONFERENCE GUIDANCE FOR CHAIRS, MODERATORS, AND ATTENDEES

In the interest of creating more just, inclusive, and productive conference sessions, the AJS has developed the following guidelines:

Visuals and handouts. Whenever possible, all photographs and videos should be captioned and handouts should be in at least 18-point font for greater accessibility. If speakers plan to use anything other than English on a handout or a slide, they should have an English translation available.

Timekeeping. Keeping control of time is critical so that each person on the panel has an equal opportunity to present their paper. To that end, the chair is responsible for making sure that panelists speak for no longer than their allotted time (fifteen or twenty minutes). The AJS will provide five-minute warning, one-minute warning, and "time is up" signs for chairs to use. Chairs should sit close to the podium or near the speaker, so that they are able to communicate with the speakers while they're presenting. Ideally, there should always be at least fifteen minutes for questions

and answers. During that period, the audience should avoid jargon, speak "leanly" (no more than thirty seconds), and use a microphone to make sure everyone can hear.

Q&A. To ensure parity in audience participation, chairs should be mindful of who is asking questions. Research shows that when women or gender-nonconforming people are called on first, there tends to be more gender balance among subsequent questioners. Another best practice is to take three questions at a time and then give the panel a chance to respond in turn. This allows panelists to respond to only those questions they choose. Ideally, the panel will get through two rounds of three questions each.

Microphones. Presenters and respondents should use the microphone, even if they think they are loud enough to be heard without it. During the question-andanswer period, the chair should use the microphone to amplify audience questions.



Avoiding jargon. If panelists use technical jargon or foreignlanguage terms or phrases that some session attendees are not likely to understand, the chair should ask them to define or translate the relevant terminology.

Encouraging inclusion. Chairs and participants should refer to all panelists equally. We recommend having the chair introduce panelists/ speakers using their first and last names, so as to avoid using titles that some presenters/respondents might not have. More complete guidelines can be found at:

Trembling before G-d

■ Documentary by Sandi Simcha DuBowski, 2001 ● 94 minutes ♀ Israel, France, USA *Trembling before G-d* was the first documentary to portray gay and lesbian Orthodox Jews trying to reconcile their sexuality with their faith. The film follows the lives of several of them in the United States and Israel and includes interviews with rabbis and psychotherapists about Orthodox attitudes toward homosexuality. Among the interviewees is Rabbi Steven Greenberg, known as the first openly gay Orthodox-ordained Jewish rabbi. The film won numerous awards, including Best Documentary at the 2001 Berlin and Chicago film festivals.

Babi Yar. Context

■ Documentary by Sergei Loznitsa, 2021 ● 121 minutes ● Netherlands, Ukraine On September 29-30, 1941, Germans and their local auxiliaries murdered 33,771 Jews at the Babi Yar ravine in Kyiv. This slaughter, which returned to the headlines after Russian forces bombed the memorial site on March 1, 2022, is the focal point of Ukrainian director Sergei Loznitsa's observational documentary *Babi Yar. Context*. Collaged from archival footage, much of it in color, *Babi Yar. Context* recounts the events that led up to and followed this largest single massacre of Jews during the Holocaust in rich and disturbing detail.
